The Japan Foundation is Japan's only institution dedicated to carrying out comprehensive international cultural exchange programs' throughout the world. The three major focuses of our activities are Arts and Cultural Exchange, Japanese-Language Education Overseas, and Japanese Studies and Global Partnerships Programs. The Japan Foundation has a global network consisting of the Tokyo Headquarters, the Kyoto Office, two affiliated organizations (the Japan Foundation Japanese-Language Institute, Urawa; and the Japan Foundation Japanese-Language Institute, Kansai) and 25 overseas offices (As of March 31, 2023). We are working to facilitate exchange in a variety of fields with the aim of further deepening mutual understanding and ties between Japanese people and the world.

# Message from the President

The Japan Foundation celebrated the milestone of its 50th anniversary in 2022.

The year 2022 saw the spread of COVID-19 begin to show signs of slowing to a certain extent as the world gradually transitioned toward "living with COVID-19" and "post-pandemic" phases. Under these conditions, the Japan Foundation was able to fully resume programs involving the exchange of people in the three fields of "culture, language and dialogue" and we could once again truly sense the significance of these "real" in-person programs. At the same time, the Japan Foundation received a variety of suggestions regarding the ideal shape of its programs based on experiences with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Japan Foundation Awards held an in-person award ceremony for the first time in three years. This award ceremony was attended by Their Imperial Highnesses Prince and Princess Akishino, who offered us their words of encouragement by stating, "The role of the Japan Foundation will become more important than ever before as cultural exchanges become increasingly necessary in the future international community."

In commemoration of its 50th anniversary, the Japan Foundation launched a special website *Weaving Ties with the World for 50 Years and Onward*. This commemorative site posts articles spotlighting the main activities undertaken by the Japan Foundation to the present as well as articles introducing people who are active on the front lines of international cultural exchanges in regions across the world. I would be grateful if you visit this website and take a look back on our half century of international cultural exchanges.

In FY2022, the Japan Foundation resumed various programs in each field making use of its experiences and accumulated knowledge gained during the COVID-19 pandemic. In the field of "Culture," we established a new video portal site that introduces Japan's diverse arts and culture providing multilingual subtitles while also implementing numerous face-to-face people exchange programs, such as inviting overseas curators to Japan and dispatching experts to international bookfairs, that were suspended during the COVID-19 pandemic. Meanwhile, for our Japanese film screening programs, we accelerated hybrid initiatives that effectively combine on-site and online screenings to expand the circle of audiences around the world. In the field of "Language," the results of the Survey Report on Japanese-Language Education Abroad 2021 were announced in November. This survey confirmed that over 3.79 million people are learning Japanese at more than 18,000 educational institutions in 141 countries and regions, with a wide variety of purposes and reasons for learning. In the field of "Dialogue," the international symposium "International Cultural Exchange in a Fragile World: Views from Germany, the U.K., and Japan" was held in collaboration with the Goethe-Institut and the British Council. Representatives from various organizations and experts in related fields deepened

their discussions on new possibilities and future visions for cultural exchange while interjecting their own experiences and practices. Additionally, the Japan Foundation held an international symposium in Tokyo that brought together leading intellectuals from Southeast Asia and Japan and the next-generation of experts to discuss a variety of issues regarding new ASEAN-Japan relations for the next half century.

The year 2023 marks the 50th Year of ASEAN-Japan Friendship and Cooperation. The Japan Foundation intends to implement appealing cultural exchange programs to contribute to the further development of ASEAN-Japan relations while taking full advantage of the excitement of this anniversary and the achievements of the "WA Project": Toward Interactive Asia through "Fusion and Harmony" implemented by the Japan Foundation from 2014 through 2021.

Furthermore, the Japan Foundation will continue to carry out activities throughout the world that capture current trends and opportunities to ensure it can make further leaps forward over the next 50 years. I ask for your continued understanding and support.

We follow the trajectory of the festival, which was produced on an unprecedented scale, with the Japan Foundation serving as the Secretariat and hosting numerous events

In the years that have followed this disaster, the Japan Foundation has implemented a wide range of reconstruction assistance projects in the area. # Arts and Cultural Exchange

Coming into contact with arts and cultures from other countries generates and stimulates people's interest and empathy beyond language barriers. By introducing diverse aspects of Japanese arts and culture to people around the world, we bring people closer together.



We introduce people around the world to the richness of Japanese arts and culture through a variety of ways in a broad range of areas from traditional to contemporary arts, including exhibitions, stage performances, translation and publication, films and television. While gradually resuming face-to-face exchanges and events where people gather, we also continued to focus on the online initiatives we have expanded, pursuing various forms of exchange appropriate for the era of living with COVID-19.

# Toward Cultural and Artistic Exchange in the "New Normal"

We have resumed our previously paused in-person professional exchanges, offering fellowships to experts in Japanese art abroad, hosting international art curators in Japan and dispatching Japanese picture book critics to international children's bookfairs. These initiatives have rekindled face-to-face interactions and the exchange of knowledge and information.

We concurrently launched Doors to Arts of Japan, a portal website showcasing the richness of Japanese arts and culture through multilingual subtitled videos. This, coupled with the STAGE BEYOND BORDERS project that streams Japanese stage performances and has amassed over 18 million views, continues to draw a vast viewership.

Building on our experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic, we will continue to fully leverage online platforms while discerning and combining the use of online and in-person formats. We are committed to enhancing our information dissemination and network building, aiming to establish a foundation for cultural and artistic exchange in this new era.

# Commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Normalization of Japan-China Relations Amid the Lingering Effects of the COVID-19 Pandemic

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the normalization of diplomatic relations between Japan and China, we orchestrated an exhibition showcasing the works of 22 distinguished groups of Japanese architects, alongside a theatrical adaptation of an iconic Japanese comic into a musical. Despite the ongoing challenges posed by the COVID-19 Pandemic, these collaborative endeavors between Japan and China came to fruition and captivated an audience of nearly 50,000, sparking considerable excitement. Spanning three months from November 2022, the Beyond Borders: Architectures of Japan exhibition of contemporary Japanese architecture took place at the Shenzhen Sea World Culture and Arts Center, which was designed by MAKI Fumihiko. The event showcased major architectural works by Japanese architects in China. Although the exhibition was hosted exclusively in one city, the number of visitors exceeded 20,000, while the virtual symposium held in conjunction saw an attendance of 3,000 individuals and garnered a wealth of positive feedback.

The musical Fist of the North Star (Hokuto no Ken), featuring a Japanese cast with the participation of Chinese dancers, was originally planned for live performances in China. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, however, the performances were streamed online and gained significant response on social media.



### Japanese Film Screenings Around the World

We showcased Japanese films in 69 countries and regions, reaching an audience of approximately 140,000. In the United Kingdom, marking the 20th anniversary of our film tour, we conducted 172 screenings across 24 cities. In Germany and Argentina, we held special screenings to honor TANAKA Kinuyo, celebrating her directorial achievements alongside her acting career. The MORITA Yoshimitsu film retrospective in New York in the United States, for which producer MISAWA Kazuko came on stage, attracted a large crowd. Commemorating the 70th Anniversary of Friendship between Japan and Cambodia, the Japanese Film Festival (JFF) in Cambodia, with the opening attended by the Cambodian Minister of Culture and Fine Arts, presented 29 Japanese films spanning genres from classics to anime. In addition, films supplied to screenings hosted by Japanese embassies and consulates drew an additional 40,000 viewers\*.

### Free Online Streaming Program JFF+ INDEPENDENT CINEMA

We launched the free online streaming project, JFF+ INDEPENDENT CINEMA, which centers on independent theaters, so-called "mini-theaters" in regional cities known for screening a diverse array of exceptional Japanese films and maintaining deep ties with local communities in Japan. This project was conducted globally from December 2022 to June 2023. In the four months up to March 2023, the dedicated website for this project attracted approximately 130,000 unique visitors and recorded around 410,000 page views. The films streamed were viewed by a total of around 20,000 people across 113 countries and regions, with the number of plays reaching approximately 30,000.



### **Introducing Japanese Television Programs**

We implement projects for introducing Japanese television programs that promote an understanding of Japan in countries and regions where there is difficulty in broadcasting and distributing Japanese content. In FY2022, 714 Japanese television programs, including dramas, anime, variety shows, films and documentaries, were broadcast in 93 countries and regions.



# Establishing Environments for Japanese-Language Education Overseas

To ensure that high-quality and stable Japanese-language education is widely implemented overseas, the Japan Foundation collaborated with local government agencies and principal Japanese-language education institutions taking into consideration the circumstances of each country and region and mainly carried out the following programs to promote the establishment of Japanese-language education environments in each country and region.

### **Dispatch of Japanese-Language Specialists**

The Japan Foundation dispatched Japanese-Language Specialists, Japanese-Language Assistants and young Japanese-Language Instructors (J-LEAP) to the offices of the Japan Foundation, Ministries of Education and educational institutions overseas (42 countries, 130 posts) to train local Japanese-language teachers, give advice on preparing teaching materials and Japanese-language teaching methods, support the formation of networks among teachers and visit educational institutions. In-person activities have resumed as the COVID-19 pandemic subsides.



Japanese-Language Specialists from the Japan Foundation, Seoul contributed to course design and operation and hosted one-day Japanese-language camps where Korean elementary and middle school students enjoy learning Japanese.

#### **Support for Japanese-Language Education Institutions**

The Japan Foundation provided special support programs for the promotion of Japanese-language activities such as the management of Japanese-language courses, the purchase and production of teaching materials, speech contests, Japanese-language education seminars and symposia carried out by the JF Nihongo Network ("Sakura Network") members and Japanese-language educational institutions around the world.

\* Sakura Network Members are core Japanese-language educational institutions/organizations located in each country. As of March 31, 2023, the membership included 357 institutions in 102 countries/regions.

### Training for Overseas Japanese-Language Teachers

The Japan Foundation conducted training programs for Japanese-language teachers aimed at enhancing the skills of those responsible for teaching Japanese abroad. We have fully resumed the invitation-based and group training sessions that were mostly put on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, we have continued the online training programs that were initiated in FY2021, providing opportunities to learn the theories of teaching methodologies and foundational knowledge for instruction online.

## Japanese-Language Education for Japanese Children Resident Overseas and for the Descendants of Migrants

With regards to the Japanese-language education environment for the children of Japanese nationals who emigrated overseas and children with foreign and Japanese parents, the Japan Foundation co-sponsored part of the annual conference of the Bilingual/Multilingual Child Network (BMCN). We also held seminars and built networks in South Korea, Australia, Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom, Spain, Germany, Brazil and Mexico.

# **NIHONGO Partners Program**

# People of Diverse Ages and Backgrounds Communicate in Real Japanese and Learn from Each Other

NIHONGO Partners serve as partners for Japanese-language teachers and their students in Asia by acting as teaching assistants and introducing Japanese culture. In FY2022, we sent 279 people to middle and high schools and universities in seven ASEAN countries as well as China and Taiwan. Even if they do not have expert knowledge, NIHONGO Partners with a zeal for exchange with Asia can all display their respective experiences and strengths and share the living Japanese and real Japan that comes from being native speakers. They show respect to teachers, learners and local community members, interact on an equal footing, and learn about the local language and culture at their destinations, deepening their bonds with the local people.

By introducing aspects of Japanese culture that students are interested in, I have discovered that the commonplace elements of daily life in Japan are, in fact, aspects of a rich culture and tradition to be proud of. Learning about Japan's new side alongside students has been a delightful experience that has expanded my horizons. As I move forward in my journey as an elementary school teacher, I am inspired to share the subtle beauties of Japan that might otherwise go unnoticed in our day-today experiences. I worked with an NP to practice Japanese pronunciation with students interested in participating in a Japanese speech contest. 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# **Providing Learning Opportunities for Students**

The Japan Foundation invited foreign service officers, public officials and specialists from various countries to train practical Japanese-language skills for their jobs and research, in addition to implementing training programs in Japan for Japanese-language learners from overseas. The aims were not only to enhance Japanese-language proficiency but also to deepen participants' comprehensive understanding of Japan through exchanges with partner institutions and various cultural experiences.

# **Enhancing Overseas Japanese-Language Teaching Methods and Proficiency Assessments** of Japanese-Language Learners

To promote the Japanese language, the Japan Foundation provided new teaching methods and learning materials and implemented the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) and the Japan Foundation Test for Basic Japanese (JFT-Basic) for Japanese-language learners as well as conducted research related to Japanese-language education.

## Disseminating Information about Japanese-Language Teaching Methods and **Providing Learning Materials**

The JF Standard for Japanese-Language Education is a framework developed by the Japan Foundation for considering ways to learn and teach the Japanese language and make evaluations based on the concept of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). We enhanced Marugoto: Japanese Language and Culture and Irodori: Japanese for Life in Japan, teaching materials based on the JF Standard. For Marugoto, we expanded the coursebook levels published in China and Egypt and provided supporting teaching materials in multiple languages on the Marugoto website, while we enriched the contents of Irodori. We also launched a new website designed for utilizing the Japanese-language learning program ひきだすにほんご Activate Your Japanese! (FY2021, co-produced with NHK Educational) as a teaching tool. This website offers segmented videos of the program by section, multilingual subtitles, downloadable materials and web-exclusive videos, all of which are useful for both classroom instruction and self-study.

## Survey on Japanese-Language **Education Abroad**

To obtain an accurate picture of the current state of Japaneselanguage teaching around the world, the Japan Foundation has been conducting every 3 years a survey of overseas organizations offering Japanese-language courses. In addition to announcing the results of the survey conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic in FY2021, various reports, statistical tables and a search engine for institutions offering Japanese-language education have been made publicly available on the Japan Foundation website. We conducted a survey on the implementation of online classes for the first time and confirmed that they were in place in over 60% of institutions worldwide

# **Development and Operation of e-Learning**

The number of annual participants of the Japanese-language learning platform JF Japanese e-Learning Minato reached approximately 143,000 people in 189 countries and regions. In response to an increasing demand for online education, we expanded our content offerings, including the addition of the Marugoto Japanese Online Course for pre-intermediate (A2B1) students. Additionally, we launched new online courses for Japanese-language teachers.



Launched in 1984, the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) is the world's largest-scale test measuring the Japanese-language skills of non-native speakers. In FY2022, the July test was newly held in Leicester (U.K.), Jeddah (Saudi Arabia) and Aguascalientes (Mexico) amid signs of recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. Approximately 268,000 people applied for the exam in 141 cities in 52 countries around the world and 215,000 took it. For the December test, Ubon Ratchathani (Thailand), Chisinau (Moldova), Vancouver (Canada), Monterey Bay (U.S.) and Riyadh (Saudi Arabia) were included for the first time, with 293,000 applicants from 193 cities in 81 countries and 241,000 test-takers.


Commenced in 2019, the Japan Foundation Test for Basic Japanese (JFT-Basic) is a computer-based test to measure the Japanese-language proficiency needed by foreign nationals about to reside in Japan mainly for work, to communicate in everyday life situations. In FY2022, the test was newly implemented in Bangladesh, and approximately 47,000 people (30,600 in FY2021) took the test in Japan and in 19 cities of 11 countries in Asia.

# **Japanese-Language Education Programs for Acceptance of Foreign Human Resources**

The Japan Foundation promoted initiatives in nine Asian countries, including Indonesia and the Philippines to support the acquisition of Japanese-language proficiency by people aiming to live and work in Japan. We added five languages to the web-based Japanese-language teaching material Irodori: Japanese for Life in Japan for a total of 16 languages, and the material was accessed approximately 2.98 million times this fiscal year. Meanwhile, for the Irodori Japanese Online Course, which was developed based on the same materials, we newly released Japanese and English versions of the starter (A1) course and eight language versions of the elementary 1 and elementary 2 (A2) courses. In various countries, Japanese-Language Specialists and Japanese for Life in Japan Coordinators introduced teaching materials and held seminars on how to teach.

### 25th Anniversary of the **Japan Foundation Japanese-**Language Institute, Kansai

The Japan Foundation Japanese-Language Institute, Kansai celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2022. For the ceremony, we invited Aleksandra Kovač, the Serbian Ambassador to Japan and a former participant in our training programs, to share her insights gained through the training.

In March 2023, we held a commemorative symposium online with the theme of supporting Japanese-language education to assist with the acceptance and coexistence of foreign workers in Japan. The aims were to introduce the Japan Foundation's resources, such as educational materials, and initiatives in various countries, and to consider their application for the support of Japaneselanguage education in Japan.

# Japanese Studies Overseas

To deepen understanding of Japan overseas, the Japan Foundation is supporting Japanese Studies in various countries and undertaking initiatives that promote networking between researchers and research institutes worldwide.

#### **Japanese Studies Fellowships**

In the "Japanese Studies Fellowships" program, we offered scholars and researchers engaging in Japan-related research overseas the opportunity to conduct research activities in Japan. In FY2022, we newly welcomed 84 fellows, in addition to the 133 fellows continuing from the previous fiscal year, resulting in a total of 217 fellows conducting research activities in Japan. Also, we newly organized several exchange programs such as Fellow Conferences, networking events, report sessions on the experience of former fellows and presentations of research activities.



### "Fifty Years of Japanese Studies in China"

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the normalization of Japan-China diplomatic relations and the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the Japan Foundation, interviews were conducted with 40 individuals related to Japanese Studies. The recorded interviews capture the enduring significance of Japanese studies in China, which has consistently connected people's hearts even amidst significant historical changes. These interviews have been compiled into a documentary video and are also made available on the internet as individual archives for each participant.

### Support for Japanese Studies Organizations

We aim to promote the long-term development and expansion of Japanese studies overseas by providing support to institutions engaging in Japanese studies in various countries and regions.

We aim to contribute to the advancement and evolution of Japanese studies overseas by fostering cross-disciplinary connections and promoting network building among researchers, experts on Japan and related institutions involved in Japanese studies.

# International Dialogue and Networking

The Japan Foundation is engaged in promoting dialogue on common global issues through international symposia, seminars and workshops, and in building human networks as well as pioneering dialogue aimed at creating and sharing new values. We also organize citizen and youth exchange programs, along with human resource development initiatives, designed to lay the groundwork for future interactions.

### International Symposium on the 50th Year of ASEAN-Japan Friendship and Cooperation

The Japan Foundation hosted an international symposium to commemorate the 50th anniversary of ASEAN-Japan Friendship and Cooperation. Thirteen distinguished experts from Southeast Asia and next-generation leaders visited Japan for this special occasion, including Dr. Marty Natalegawa, former Indonesian Foreign Minister, who delivered the keynote speech. They were joined by Japanese experts for three panel discussions on new ASEAN-Japan relations for the next half century: "Toward Global and Regional Peace and Stability (politics)," "Toward a Sustainable and Prosperous Society (economy/society)" and "Toward Mutual Understanding and Trust Building (culture)."

#### The Japan Foundation, in collaboration with the Maureen and Mike Mansfield Foundation, supports this program with an aim to foster a network of new generation scholars and professionals specializing in Japan and policy issues pertinent to the U.S.-Japan relationship. The program provides opportunities to further the participants' understanding of agendas in both countries and build upon their networks. In 2022, the 5th cohort of participants joined the study tours to Tokyo, Kyoto and Osaka in May, and participated in concluding sessions in Washington, D.C. in August.

### Japan-U.S. Global Partnership Program

The Japan Foundation has conducted various projects in collaboration with counterparts from both Japan and the United States, with the goal of working together to address global challenges. These projects are centered around themes such as "Building a resilient society,""Developing an inclusive society" and "Creating a society enriched by science and technology." The aim is to facilitate cooperation and foster human resource development between the two nations.

### Japan-China 21st Century Friendship Program

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the normalization of Japan-China relations, the Japan Foundation organized a Short-Short Story Contest aimed at deepening youth exchanges between the two countries. Japanese and Chinese students participated in creative writing, expressing their ideas freely. Also, in February 2023, we organized the "Japan-China 21st Century Friendship Program" participant gathering in Tokyo to facilitate networking among past participants. Over 100 attendees from programs such as the Long-Term Exchange Program for Chinese High School Students and Centers for "Face-to-Face Exchanges" in China came together to discuss how their experiences in Japan-China exchange programs are currently being applied and shared their stories.

# **Awards**

**The Japan Foundation** Awards

The Japan Foundation awards are given to individuals and groups who have made and are expected to further make particularly significant contributions to the promotion of international mutual understanding and friendship through academic, artistic or other cultural activities. For the 49th edition of the awards in FY2022, we selected three recipients after the screening of 74 nominations. The award ceremony was attended by Their Imperial Highnesses Crown Prince and Princess Akishino.

#### **Recipients and Reasons for the FY2022 Japan Foundation Awards**

#### Robert LEPAGE (Actor, Playwright, theatre and movie Director) [Canada]

Robert Lepage is an actor, stage director and playwright who leads the creative group Ex Machina, founded in Canada. Lepage's activities span a broad range of fields that include theater, opera, film and the circus. Particularly noteworthy, Lepage's unique productions that boldly incorporate the latest technology have earned high acclaim worldwide for overturning conventional wisdom.

Lepage has a deep connection with Japan and has had a significant influence on Japanese performing arts through public performances in Japan of productions such as the Hiroshima-themed work, The Seven Streams of the River Ota, and active collaborations with Japanese artists. His activities have contributed to the promotion of international mutual understanding.



#### Korean Japanese Association [Korea]

The Korean Japanese Association was founded in 1971 to promote friendship, goodwill and mutual prosperity between Korea and Japan. During the 50 years that have passed since that time, the organization has continued its earnest future-oriented activities targeting youth in the field of Japanese-language education, which is the foundation of mutual understanding between Korea and Japan. The organization has been involved in programs to identify and develop young talent. These programs include holding the Japanese language studies achievement contest for Korean middle and high school students in Korea, a Japanese translation competition for university students and the Lee Soo Hyun Memorial Program every year. The organization is also working hard to support the future careers of youth by holding the Japan Education and Career Fair.

In this manner, the organization has contributed to mutual understanding, friendship and goodwill between Korea and Japan and to nurturing youth through its many years of diverse exchange activities for youth.



#### Goenawan Mohamad (Poet, Writer and Painter) [Indonesia]

Goenawan Mohamad is one of the intellectual giants of his generation in Asia and is one of Indonesia's leading intellectuals who displays his extremely multifaceted talent as a journalist, citizen activist, poet and playwright. Goenawan launched the weekly magazine Tempo in 1971 through which he continued to stress the importance of freedom and democracy in Indonesia. Goenawan's activities are wide ranging, and he has demonstrated his diverse abilities in the fields of poetry, drama and fine arts and has contributed to art in general along with his writings. Goenawan has long-standing ties with Japan. Goenawan came to Japan in 1997 under the Asia Leadership Fellowship co-sponsored by the Japan Foundation and the International House of Japan and since then he has expanded his relations in a variety of fields. Goenawan is contributing to intellectual exchange between Indonesia and Japan within a global perspective focused on Asia.



**The Japan Foundation Prizes for Global Citizenship** 

The Japan Foundation Prizes for Global Citizenship are awarded to organizations in Japan that engage in original, forward-thinking initiatives for deepening ties between Japan and other countries, facilitating the exchange of knowledge, ideas and information and encouraging collaborative thinking. In FY2022, the 38th edition of the awards, three organizations were selected as recipients. The award ceremony and reception were attended by Her Imperial Highness Princess Takamado.

#### **Recipients and Reasons for the FY2022 Japan Foundation Prizes for Global Citizenship**

#### Alece Takaoka [Takaoka City, Toyama]

Alece Takaoka is an organization that promotes programs such as learning support for young people with foreign roots so that they can build bridges between Japan and their root countries and contribute to the local community. Additionally, the organization has gone beyond the framework of support for children with foreign roots by developing a citizenship educational program that enables all members of the community to become citizens who understand and respect their mutual differences and accept diversity. The organization is working hard to achieve a multicultural society and contribute to the revitalization of the local community as it addresses the issues faced by a community interspersed with residents with foreign roots.


Peace Culture Village [Hiroshima City, Hiroshima]

Peace Culture Village operates a peace guide program and dialogue programs for visitors to Hiroshima from throughout the world. It leverages online tours and XR technology (a general term for technology that fuses the real world and virtual world) to develop new initiatives with youth participation at a time when many similar organizations struggle to continue operations due to the aging of their story tellers 77 years after the atomic bomb was dropped. The organization planned online tours and classes in partnership with a travel agency during the COVID-19 pandemic. They have also created a system by which youths can participate in paid work, and these initiatives offer new possibilities not only for peaceful cultural activities, but for international exchange as well.

#### **Chiiki Support Wakasa** [Naha City, Okinawa]

Chiiki Support Wakasa is an NPO that was established through local resident cooperation in order to take over the management of the Naha City Wakasa Community Center when it was privatized. The organization has a reputation for unique, high-quality programs and detailed communications with artists, while also respecting self-government and supporting the autonomous activities of local residents. Under their motto, "leave no one behind", the organization serves as a safety net for individuals who are not a part of local community structures, such as single parent families, children from diverse family backgrounds and foreign residents. The organization also supports the activities of Nepalese residents, who have been increasing in number in recent years, playing a role in exchange and mutual understanding with local residents.









# **Overseas Office Initiatives in 2022**

The Japan Foundation has 25 offices in 24 countries, and we carry out various activities in the fields of Arts and Cultural Exchange, Japanese-Language Education and Japanese Studies and Global Partnerships Programs based on our country- and region-specific activity policies and according to the conditions in each country or region. #### Isola del Cinema Film Festival "Summer in Japan"

The Isola del Cinema film festival was held again after a two-year hiatus as a collaboration between the Embassy of Japan in Italy, the Japan National Tourism Organization Rome Office and the Japan Cultural Institute in Rome. Under the theme "Shikoku," the event featured the screening of *Belle*, an animated film set in Kochi, as well as a workshop and an Awa Odori dance performance by Takarabune. Attendees also had the opportunity to practice calligraphy, wear yukata and obtain tourism information about Shikoku and other popular destinations in Japan. The enthusiastic involvement of many residents of all ages made the event a resounding success.

#### **Japanese Food Showcase**

During the months of January and February 2023, the Japan Cultural Institute in Cologne organized a special program highlighting Japanese food. With the support of local Japanese companies, the program featured eight interdisciplinary events that covered the fields of arts and culture, Japanese-language education and international dialogue. These events included a poster exhibition called *Graphic Design of Food* (co-sponsored by the DNP Foundation for Cultural Promotion), which introduced the food-related works of over 20 Japanese graphic designers. There were also film screenings, talks about food, academic lectures and Japanese-language classes. The event successfully showcased the broad appeal of Japanese food culture, which is popular in Germany.

#### Serial Film Screening Event. One

For the first time outside of Japan, the Japan Cultural Institute in Paris hosted a screening of the complete Otoko wa Tsurai yo (It's Tough Being a Man) series of 50 Japanese films. Over the course of more than a year, the 300-seat venue consistently drew a nearly full house. The subtle nuances of human emotions resonated strongly with the French audience, creating lively screenings filled with cheers and laughter at every show. A video message from director YAMADA Yoji was shown to the audience, who responded with enthusiastic applause. As part of the screenings, short events were also organized to introduce the regions featured in the films, showcasing the multifaceted charm of Japan.

#### Textbook Analysis Workshop for Japanese-Language Teachers—Let's Explore Textbooks from around the World!

In preparation for the upcoming revision of Korea's education curriculum, set to be fully implemented in 2025, the Japan Foundation, Seoul organized in-person workshops primarily for Japanese-language teachers at junior and senior high schools. The program included examining Japanese-language textbooks used in secondary education from four countries worldwide, as well as a lecture given by the author of the Australian textbook. This initiative was presented at academic conferences on Japanese-language education in Korea. Additionally, the office also provided advice and guidance on the actual revised curriculum for Japanese language subjects, as well as on ongoing Japanese-language textbook manuscripts.

# Project commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Normalization of Japan-China Relations

Amid the lingering impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Japan Foundation, Beijing organized events to mark the 50th anniversary of the normalization of Japan-China relations. This included organizing and hosting online symposia related to the *Beyond Borders: Architectures of Japan* exhibition of contemporary Japanese architecture, creating and releasing the "Fifty Years of Japanese Studies in China" interview series in video and written formats, and arranging a traditional tea ceremony demonstration and workshop led by the Urasenke school at a private commercial facility. These initiatives used this milestone year as an opportunity to increase mutual understanding.

#### **Online Lecture Series on Japanese Culture**

In collaboration with the University of Sumatera Utara, Mahasaraswati Denpasar University and BINUS University, the Japan Foundation, Jakarta co-hosted online lectures and workshops on five themes: Gyojishoku (seasonal event food), Kimono, Kumihimo (Japanese braids), Wagashi (Japanese confectionery) and Nihon Buyo (Japanese dance). The instructors were renowned experts including KOMIYA Rimi (chairperson, Gyojishoku Association), KINOSHITA Beniko (co-founder, Kinoshita Kimono Lab), HATTA Shun (Showen Kumihimo), IRIE Mai (Wagashi artist) and FUJIMA Etsuko (dancer). The series attracted a total of approximately 2,000 participants, enabling them to have a deeper understanding of Japanese culture.

#### "Shoyu Tasting and My Shoyu Making" Lecture and Demonstration

The Japan Foundation, Bangkok invited OKADA Kaori, the 18th-generation owner of Kamebishi-ya, a well-established soy sauce maker in Kagawa prefecture, Japan, to Bangkok and Khon Kaen to give a special lecture and demonstration workshop entitled Shoyu Tasting and My Shoyu Making. Shoyu in Japan and Nampla and Pladaek in Thailand are traditional fermented seasonings that have been loved by both countries for centuries. The goal of the events was to share insights into Japanese fermentation methods and recent innovations, as well as to explore the food cultures of Japan and Thailand with local experts.

As part of the cultural introduction program, world-renowned taiko drummer Leonard Eto was invited for a collaborative performance with Tusa Montes, a percussionist playing the Kulintang, a traditional Philippine instrument. Despite the long period of time since the last Nihongo Fiesta was held in person, the venue was lively with over 300 spectators gathering, creating a vibrant and enthusiastic atmosphere.

Origami workshops for creating Hina dolls and an exhibition of Japanese figurines owned by Myanmar's otaku groups were also held. To increase people's understanding of Japanese dolls, an exhibition tour was also offered, mainly for Japanese-language learners, which attracted a large number of visitors.

#### Introduction of Japanese Culture in Northeast India

#### Storymakers in Contemporary Japanese Art

The Storymakers in Contemporary Japanese Art exhibition was held from July 2022 to January 2023. Curated collaboratively by Japanese and Australian curators MURAI Mayako and Emily Wakeling, the exhibition presented a total of ten art pieces by five Japanese contemporary artists, working with different types of media, including drawing, video and sculpture. The program also included a panel discussion that included the Australian curator and artists, as well as a film screening related to the artists' workshop exhibition.

#### **Children's Literature Author KASHIWABA Sachiko** Invited to Toronto

KASHIWABA Sachiko, a prolific writer of children's and young adult fantasy, was invited to the Toronto International Festival of Authors (TIFA). During the festival, a panel discussion was held with KASHIWABA and Canadian author Kenneth Oppel, co-hosted with TIFA. In conjunction with the discussion, the Japan Foundation, Toronto organized a range of events, including an online book club for Temple Alley Summer, discussions of Japanese legends and folklore that are frequently featured in KASHIWABA's writing, and a screening of the film The House of the Lost on the Cape. These events were well-attended and received a lot of interest. When asked by children for advice on becoming a writer, KASHIWABA captivated the audience by emphasizing the enjoyment of creating stories.

The Japan Foundation, New York organized a series of retrospective screenings featuring actor MIFUNE Toshiro, director SUZUKI Seijun and director MORITA Yoshimitsu. The special retrospectives on MIFUNE and SUZUKI toured 17 movie theaters and universities across the United States. MORITA's works were shown for ten days at Film at Lincoln Center in New York City. MISAWA Kazuko, MORITA's public and private partner, also appeared to introduce his films. The opening film, The Family Game, played to a full house, setting the tone for the successful and well-attended screenings that followed.

#### Commemorative Talk on the Release of the English Translation of MIURA Shion's Kamusari series

In recent years, Japanese authors have garnered significant attention in the United States, with a steady stream of English translations now being made available. In celebration of the recent English-language publication of MIURA Shion's Kamusari series, the Japan Foundation, Los Angeles hosted a discussion event with MIURA and her novel series' translator. The conversation delved into various themes, including the background behind the work which is connected to forestry in Japan as well as Japan's religious beliefs, and it also offered many insights into the translation process. The video features footage from the town of Misugi, the setting for the series, in Mie Prefecture (now part of Tsu City). Additionally, the video includes interviews with local forestry workers, making the content engaging and captivating for readers.

#### Special Screening of Classic Japanese Films (1935-1940s)

A curated selection of Japanese talkie films from 1935 to the 1940s was showcased at Cineteca Nacional México. The program, spanning approximately two weeks in each of the two cities, featured nine films, including Tange Sazen and the Pot of One Million Ryo directed by YAMANAKA Sadao. The works, which were produced by talented directors during the early years of talkie cinema, attracted a total audience of 3.695 with some sessions sold out. The diverse audience, including the noticeable participation of younger viewers, highlighted the entrenched popularity of Japanese cinema in Mexico, where the Japan Foundation, Mexico has been presenting classic Japanese films in collaboration with Cineteca Nacional México for more than twenty years.

#### Japan-Brazil Cultural Exchange through VR Imagery (Music and Stars)

In Brazil, Japanese festivals and various other events are held by Japanese organizations throughout the country, recognized as a significant occasion to experience traditional Japanese performing arts and pop culture. Responding to the organizers' strong desire to introduce new content at the events, the Japan Foundation, Sao Paulo set up a booth in which we exhibited original virtual reality (VR) video on the theme of Japan-Brazil friendship, music and stars. The VR video received acclaim from a diverse audience totaling 7,435 viewers in nine cities. It has also sparked ongoing interest through the organizers' network, which contributed to continuous offers to exhibit the video from them in FY2023.

#### The 18th Japanese Speech Contest for University Students

The 18th Japanese Speech Contest for University Students was held in person for the first time in three years, after it had been held online annually even during the pandemic. Many students who diligently continued their Japanese studies, despite the challenges of the pandemic, applied to participate in the contest. On Finals Day, the selected finalists showcased their academic achievements before an audience of over one hundred people. The audience was wowed by the Japanese skills of the finalists as well as the content of their speeches and presentations.

#### A Milestone in Spain: Introduction of Japanese-Language Education in Secondary School

In 2021, the Instituto de Alexandre Deulofeu in Catalonia became the first school in Spain to offer Japanese-language education as an elective subject in the secondary compulsory education curriculum. Subsequently, the Japan Foundation, Madrid has undertaken various support activities, including hosting a taiko drum workshop and a commemorative ceremony at the school which was attended by the Consul General of Japan in Barcelona, the mayor and officials from the Ministry of Education. These initiatives proved successful, leading to a decision by the Ministry of Education to expand Japanese-language courses to an additional ten schools starting in the fall of FY2023. This development highlights the significant growth of Japanese-language education in the field of secondary education in Spain.

As part of the program of the inaugural Far Eastern Classical Music Festival held in September 2022, the Japan Foundation, Budapest invited KANEKO Sumie, a koto and shamisen player, to perform for two days at the House of Music Hungary, which was designed by architect FUJIMOTO Sosuke and opened in 2022. KANEKO performed with Norbert Kael, a Hungarian jazz pianist, and KURODA Reison, a shakuhachi player, and their fluid music conveyed the charm of traditional Japanese instruments to an audience of over 500 people.



# Russia

#### Japanese-Language Teachers' Day

The Japanese Culture Department "Japan Foundation" of the All-Russia State Library for Foreign Literature hosted the Japanese-Language Teachers' Day online seminar for Japanese-language teachers. This event featured lectures by advanced Japanese-language experts and discussions between the participating teachers, all with the aim of improving skills and addressing challenges in language education. In FY2022, ten sessions were held, attracting a total of 98 participants from 24 cities. Upon the successful conclusion of each seminar, participating Japanese-language teachers were awarded a certificate of participation.

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#### The Intersecting Perspectives of Egypt and Japan Shown through Photography

The Japan Foundation, Cairo resumed inviting artists, which had been suspended due to the pandemic, and invited ARIMOTO Shinya to organize a lecture and workshop. In collaboration with an organization of Egyptian photographers, ARIMOTO and photographers from Egypt participated in an initiative to critique images taken on the streets of Cairo. This exchange, facilitated through photography, was an opportunity for Egyptian and Japanese perspectives to intersect. The photos taken by ARIMOTO and the participants were exhibited at the Foundation's Library, delighting the many visitors.



### The Japan Foundation **Center for Cultural Exchange in Vietnam**

A commemorative report conference was held online to celebrate the publication of the Vietnamese edition of Marugoto: Japanese Language and Culture coursebook at all levels. The meeting discussed reports on how the book has been implemented in Vietnam, information on teaching methods and supplementary materials and practical feedback from institutions that have utilized it. By sharing case studies and helpful information with teachers and educational institutions, the conference offered a platform for addressing inquiries and exchanging ideas related to Marugoto.



#### **Cultural Outreach in Local Communities**

Vietnamese at All Levels

In response to the challenges posed by the pandemic, the Phnom Penh Liaison Office successfully carried out cultural outreach initiatives in six regions, focusing on art and film. Notably, it organized art classes in local elementary schools using art educational materials created jointly with an art school run by a Japanese artist. The art classes were attended by approximately 250 students. In Cambodia, where public institutions have struggled to promote art education, this initiative had a significant impact, receiving approximately 2,000 reactions on the office's Facebook activity report.



#### DigiCon6 ASIA—Laos Contest

TBS Holdings, Inc. organized the qualifying round for the 24th DigiCon6 ASIA contest in Laos. This contest aims to identify outstanding short film and animation creators in 16 countries and regions throughout Asia. The top three entries were then submitted to the final competition. The top two creators from Laos were invited to the finals held in Tokyo on November 19. Among them, Siliyoupha Keosavang received the Rising Star Award. This is a remarkable achievement for a Laotian creator in an international event in this field.

# **Financial Cooperation from the Private Sector**

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The Japan Foundation's international cultural exchange programs are made possible thanks to generous financial contributions from a wide range of private-sector entities, including companies, organizations and individuals. The donation system and other aspects of private funding for FY2022 are explained below, along with a list of donors and programs supported by their funding.

#### **1. Types of Financial Cooperation**

#### (1) General Donations \_

General donations are used to fund the Japan Foundation's international cultural exchange programs.

#### **1. General Donations System**

General donations are received from companies, organizations and individuals. The amount and timing of the donation are up to the donor. Donors in FY2022 are listed on the following page under Donors for Program Expenses and Private Endowment Providers.

#### • Donations for program expenses

These donations fund the Japan Foundation's programs conducted in the same fiscal year as the donation. The donor can request the donation to be used for a specific project during the fiscal year. • Donations for operational funds (private endowments)

These donations are deposited to the Japan Foundation's funds, and the accrued interest is used for program expenses in perpetuity. The FY2022 implementation of special programs established and named at the request of the benefactors in the past is outlined on the next page under Programs Supported by Private Endowments.

#### 2. Corporate Membership System (Supporting members)

Fixed donations are received from companies and organizations as annual membership dues. They are used to fund programs conducted in the same fiscal year. Donations are made in units of 100,000 JPY. General Members donate 100,000 JPY to 400,000 JPY, and Special Members donate 500,000 JPY or more annually. Membership benefits include invitations to various events of the Japan Foundation and a copy of The Japan Foundation Annual Report. Corporate members for FY2022 are listed on the next page under Corporate Members.

#### (2) Designated Donations

Financial contributions from individuals and corporations in Japan to support international cultural exchange programs in Japan and overseas are received by the Japan Foundation as donations to be used as a subsidy for applicable cultural exchange projects. This system makes donors eligible for tax benefits for their donations.

Applicable programs are international cultural exchange activities such as personnel exchanges, overseas Japanese studies and Japanese language education programs, performances, exhibitions and seminars. Designated donations are reviewed by a screening committee of outside experts to decide whether to accept the donation. Programs funded by designated donations in FY2022 are listed on the next page under Programs Supported by Designated Donations.

#### (3) Other Types of Private Financial Support

Besides donations, the Japan Foundation receives private-sector financial support in various forms such as cooperation funds and grants. Examples of such support in FY2022 are listed on the next page under Primary Examples of Non-Donation Financial Support.

#### 2. Tax Benefits for Donations

The Japan Foundation is a "Designated Public Benefit Organization" in accordance with Article 77 of the Order for Enforcement of the Corporation Tax Act and Article 217 of the Order for Enforcement of the Income Tax Act. This makes Japan-based donations to the Japan Foundation eligible for the following tax benefits.

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#### (1) For Corporations

The total donation amount to the Designated Public Benefit Organization or the maximum deductible donation amount to the Designated Public Benefit Organization, whichever is smaller, is treated as a loss.

NB 1: If the total donation amount to Designated Public Benefit Organization is larger, the amount not treated as a loss (the amount exceeding the maximum deductible amount of donation to Designated Public Benefit Organizations) is included in the amount of normal donations. The maximum deductible amount of a donation is calculated as follows:

#### • Donations to Designated Public Benefit Organizations (Maximum Deductible Donation Amount)

(Amount of capital x Number of months for the period/12 x 0.375%

- + Amount of income x 6.25%) x 1/2
- Normal donations

(Amount of capital x Number of months for the period/12 x 0.25% + Amount of income x 2.5%) x 1/4

#### (2) For Individuals

The total donation amount minus 2,000 JPY (up to 40% of the gross income) is deductible from income. Donations of inherited assets are also eligible for beneficial taxation treatment.

NB 2: From the designated donations received, 194,673,467 JPY plus the 9,393,966 JPY carried over from FY2021 were given as subsidies to ten programs (see Programs Supported by Designated Donations on the next page). The remaining 58,091,284 JPY of the designated donations will be provided as subsidies to four programs in FY2023.

- NB 3: From the establishment of the Japan Foundation in 1972 to the end of FY2022, the cumulative amount of general donations it has received was approximately 3,110,260,000 JPY and the cumulative amount of designated donations received was approximately 72,065,080,000 JPY.
- NB 4: A total of approximately 75,000,000 JPY of non-donations was received from the private sector in FY2022 as financial cooperation (cooperation funds, grants, etc.)




