374 Japanese Youth to head for various locations in the U.S. on March 18, 2014, delivering "Charm of Regions" and "Cool Japan"

The Japan Foundation presents the "KAKEHASHI Project – The Bridge for Tomorrow" as part of the Youth Exchange Program with North America promoted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan (MOFA). In March 2014, a total of 374 high school students selected throughout Japan will be dispatched to various locations in the United States.

For two years from 2013, the KAKEHASHI Project has given and will give 4,600 Japanese and U.S. students and young people the opportunity to go to the

United States and come to visit Japan. The fifth group of Japanese students will be off to the U.S. for 10 days, each looking for the opportunities such as presentations on the strength and beauty of cultures in the regions of Japan in addition to "Cool Japan", and debriefing session, school exchange programs and homestays.
